The Start Me Up Niagara community is a welcome safe place open to all, 365 days a year. Our staff is always available, and visitors have access to a variety of services, programs, and activities.

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The staff at Start Me Up Niagara use their education, training, and lived experiences combined with professional skills and natural aptitude to treat each participant with compassion, dignity, and respect.



Housing & Shelter

Prevention

Prevention programs focus on early intervention strategies to engage and collaborate with individuals at imminent risk of experiencing homelessness to maintain housing or obtain new housing.

Services include:

- Engaging new landlords
- Tribunal support and advocacy
- Mediating landlord/tenant issues
- Connection to supports and resources

Supportive Transitional Housing

Supportive Transitional Housing programs provide ongoing support and an individualized approach to eliminate barriers to long-term stable housing. Services include:

- Life skills sessions (tenancy skills, cooking/ cleaning)
- Maximising income (income tax, applying for social assistance or OAS/CPP)
- Connection to supports and resources



Temporary Winter Shelters

Temporary Winter Shelter is a coordinated approach to providing a hot meal and sanctuary to community members who experience poverty and homelessness over the harshest winter months of the year. 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WORK ACTION CENTRE

Our services are available to all living with a disability requiring employment services. Our employment team is available to help participants attain and retain employment.

Income Matters works with people experiencing poverty, homelessness, unemployment, and rely on income assistance programs for income to improve their financial situation by building skills needed to manage income, budgeting, record keeping necessary to maintain benefits, and by filling annual income tax returns that are necessary for receipt of federal income related programs, i.e. GST rebate.

The Bike Me Up program offers a variety of bike-related services. Our group of dedicated volunteers reconditions donated bicycles and offer them for sale at affordable prices. We also provide a safe work space, tools and training for our customers.

Bike Me Up also helps to keep bikes out of the local landfill sites, thus providing an environmental benefit.

Who Benefits From the Program?

Our shop was initiated to serve our local client base, but is also open to everyone in Niagara. Due to our committed volunteers, we are able to offer good bicycles for sale for \$40, making them affordable to people that need transportation.

Who Funds the Program?

Funding is provided through generous individual local donors.

Bike Me Up is located at 203 Church Street (accessible from the side of the building).





From Our Garden:

All our products are locally made by participants in our Garden Makers Program. In this nonprofit social enterprise project, participants learn how to plant, grow, harvest, preserve and use fresh herbs, fruits and vegetables through their engagement in local community gardens and kitchens. Proceeds support the participants and participating nonprofit agencies working on local poverty relief and food security.

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Healthy Kitchen:

At 17 Gale Cres., we opperate a kitchen which serves to provide our community with a safe and healthy meal every day of the year, even holidays thanks to our talented team of volunteers. We offer food preparation and kitchen activities for our participants including workshops, cooking lessons, baking lessons, canning lessons, and more.

For over 10 years, Start Me Up Niagara has enjoyed the use of a two-acre community farm space at the Vineland Research and Innovation Centre. This space was generously donated to us by the VRIC so we can grow food for our meal programs and to offer to our community at a low cost, helping us to promote wellness and food security in our neighbourhood.

In this space, we grow a wide variety of different vegetables, herbs, and beans. We welcome and transport our SMUN participants out to the farm from downtown St. Catharines, so they can not only help out if they are interested in learning about gardening, but also so they have a place to go to get away from the drama of downtown life. The produce we grow goes towards Start Me Up Niagara's drop in centre, community partners who help feed the community (food kitchens/foodbank), a "pay what you can" pop up market in front of the Work Action Centre, and a small amount of produce is used for our kitchen workshops. 5300 lbs Food Harvested
